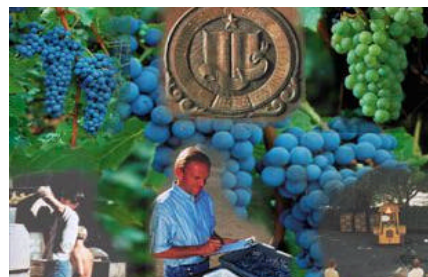

UCSF - near District 6, hosts a range of programs in the region. UCSF is one of the area's largest employers, **contributing more than \$1 billion annually to the Bay Area economy** and spawning hundreds of biotechnology enterprises. Thousands of non-university jobs are created by its presence as a result of UCSF inventions, technology or personnel. **UCSF has created 3 Nobel laureates** and is a recognized leader in patient care, biomedical research, and health science education.



UC AND THE WINE INDUSTRY

The wine industry in District 6 is heavily dependent on UC Davis' pioneering technology and innovative cultural practices. Selection of better yielding clones of chardonnay at UC fueled dramatic changes in the industry, bringing its current value to \$300 million. **Growers rely on UC's network of advisors at the Sonoma County UC Cooperative Extension office in District 6. The UC Mondavi Institute for Wine and Food Science** will serve as a global innovator in university-based wine and food programs and will house the largest and most prestigious wine and food science academic program in the world.



UCSF HEALTH CARE

The UCSF Medical Center provides services throughout District 6 and is among the world's greatest health care institutions. UCSF's Family Practice Residency program at Sutter Medical Center in Santa Rosa provides a host of community medical services to **underserved populations in District 6** - such as HIV treatment and education and targeted health outreach to Latinos.



The Breast Cancer Early Detection Program Regional Partnership, at the UCSF Comprehensive Cancer Center, provides breast cancer screening, diagnostic services, and outreach to low-income women over 40 in this district.

In response to community and scientists' concerns about high breast cancer rates in Marin County - epidemiologists from UCSF and community investigators from Marin Breast Cancer Watch began working together to document the disease in the region. **In 2002, the Marin Breast Cancer Research Collaborative was formed as a joint research project that pools the resources of UC Berkeley, UCSF and the UC-affiliated National Laboratories** as well as the Marin County Department of Health and Human Services and Marin Breast Cancer Watch. <http://cc.ucsf.edu/brca/farren.pdf>



UC's Early Academic Outreach Program (EAOP) has provided academic support, career advising, college counseling and motivational/skill-building workshops to help over 85,000 California students realize their

dreams of a college education. In the Bay Area, EAOP works with disadvantaged students **in 37 high schools and 39 middle schools in Alameda, Contra Costa, San Francisco, Santa Clara and Sonoma counties.** <http://www.eaop.org>

UC Davis' Oiled Wildlife Care Network strives to ensure that wildlife exposed to petroleum products in the environment receive treatment. The project's services are offered at the **Marine Mammal Center in Sausalito in District 6.** www.vetmed.ucdavis.edu/owcn

The UC Berkeley Environmental Health Sciences Center focuses much of its research on the **link between breast cancer and the environment and in 2002 co-sponsored a special forum on the issue in Marin** with the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences (NIEHS) and Marin Breast Cancer Watch.

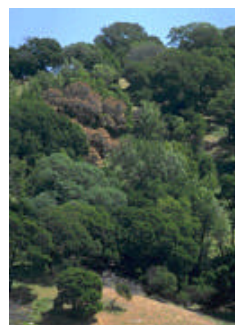
The UC Davis California Raptor Center rehabilitates injured birds of prey and serves Yolo, Solano, Marin, Contra Costa, Sacramento, Placer, Alameda, San Francisco, Glenn, San Joaquin, and Sonoma counties. The center provides hands-on training in the care and management of birds of prey and provides educational programs to the general public and the university community. <http://www.vetmed.ucdavis.edu/ars>



California Partners for Advanced Transit in Highways (PATH), at the UC Institute of Transportation Studies brings together faculty and students with private industry and

UC Cooperative Extension advisors in Marin and Sonoma counties work with Northern California communities to disseminate research information on such pressing issues as **sudden oak death** and watershed management.
