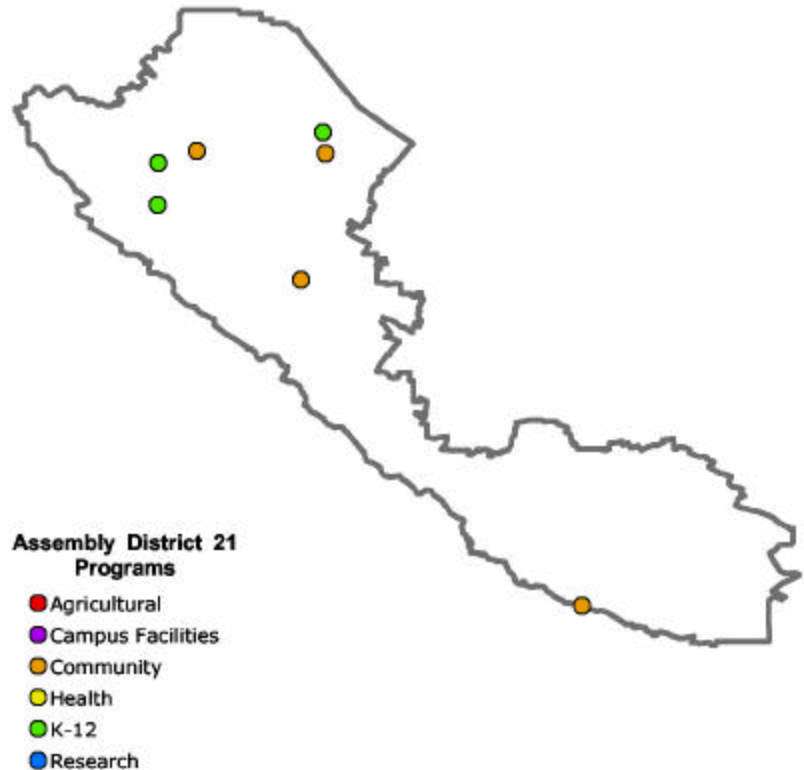


UC in Your District

UCSF - near District 21, hosts a range of programs in the region. UCSF is one of the area's largest employers, **contributing more than \$1 billion annually to the Bay Area economy** and spawning hundreds of biotechnology enterprises. Thousands of non-university jobs are created by its presence as a result of UCSF inventions, technology or personnel. **UCSF has produced three Nobel laureates** and is a recognized leader in patient care, biomedical research, and health science education. **The UCSF Medical Center provides services throughout District 21** and is among the world's greatest health care institutions.



UC'S K-12 OUTREACH

The first of its kind, **the New Teacher Center (NTC) at UC Santa Cruz** is a national resource dedicated to teacher development and the support of practices that promote excellence and diversity in America's teaching force. **The NTC works at schools throughout the South Bay including those in Redwood City and San Mateo**, to give teachers the opportunity to problem-solve with colleagues, learn new teaching strategies and exchange lesson plans.



THE CENTER FOR INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY RESEARCH IN THE INTEREST OF SOCIETY (CITRIS)

CITRIS is a collaboration between UC Berkeley, UC Davis, UC Merced, **UC Santa Cruz and private corporations**, established to sponsor information technology research that will ultimately provide solutions to the social and commercial problems that affect the lives of all Californians. Research will focus on energy efficiency, transportation, environmental monitoring, seismic safety, education and health care.



The History Through Literature Project within the UC Berkeley Area Studies department, builds curriculums for K-12 teachers on topics ranging from China's

develop the research technologies that will improve California's transport systems. PATH is working to develop lasting solutions to the state's public transit challenges.

UC Berkeley's Environmental Sciences Program and the Department of Ethnic Studies have worked in partnership with the Galileo Academy of Science and Technology and the Urban Watershed Project to implement a three-year high school environmental science course. The course incorporates field study, mentoring by UC environmental science students and web-based learning under the guidance of the National Park Service at San Francisco's Presidio.

The Institute of East Asian Studies at UC Berkeley has an interactive electronic tool that helps schools build better curriculums in world history, culture and geography. Students use simulated atlases and other techniques to explore the history, culture and economy of Asian countries.

UCSF research was among the first to identify HIV as the causative agent of the disease and the campus continues to lead in HIV treatment and research programs. **UCSF AIDS Health Project** is the sole provider of HIV-specific mental health programs and **HIV InSite**, is a comprehensive resource for treatment, prevention and policy, which links UCSF expertise with academics, doctors and patients worldwide.

The Puente Project increases the enrollment and retention of educationally underserved students in four-year universities and works with **Foothill College in Los Altos Hills and the College of San Mateo**. To date,

Puente has provided mentoring, teaching, and counseling for over 20,000 under-represented students. Puente students graduate from 4-year universities at twice the average rate.
