Campus Tours

Free campus tours are held daily, seven days a week. The 90-minute walking tours are led by trained student guides who are knowledgeable about the Berkeley campus and student life at Cal. Tours begin at 10 a.m., Monday through Friday, and leave from the Visitor Center at 101 University Hall, 2200 University Avenue, located at the corner of University Avenue and Oxford Street. Weekdays only, tours are followed by a 30-minute admissions presentation for prospective freshman applicants who have not yet applied to the University. No reservations are required for fewer than 10 people. Saturday tours begin at 10 a.m. Sunday tours begin at 1 p.m. Saturday and Sunday tours begin from the Campanile in the center of campus.

Transfer Services Counseling Program (TSCP)

The TSCP helps new transfer students quickly locate appropriate sources of assistance, advice, referrals, and other services relevant to their educational and student life needs. The TSCP also has a Transfer Student Center and Lounge within the program, providing transfer students with study rooms, a computer lab, and a lounge area to use with a refrigerator, microwave, water, coffee/tea and many other amenities at no charge to the transfer students. The TSCP also provides the "Keys to Transfer Success Mentor Program" to allow more seasoned transfer students the opportunity to assist new transfer students as they visit the Transfer Lounge. The lounge opened in fall 2007 and has been extremely popular with new and continuing transfer students at UC Irvine, servicing between 30 and 50 transfer students each day.

Community College Transfer Recruitment Program (CCTR)

CCTR provides assistance to prospective transfer students, with a particular emphasis on students who come from groups who have historically low transfer rates to UCLA and the University of California. Transfer advisers visit local community colleges several times during the semester to provide assistance with admissions, preparation for majors, financial aid, AAP/EOP and other support services. In addition, transfer advisers provide information about the application process and assist with scheduling campus tours and programs.

Transfer Alliance Program (TAP)

The UCLA Transfer Alliance Program (TAP) is an honors program offered at 45 participating California community colleges (CCC) that provides students with an opportunity to attend a CCC and transfer to UCLA at the junior level. TAP community colleges offer enriched academic programs and all courses necessary to transfer, including general education requirements and preparation for the major classes, and have designated faculty and counselors to assist students in their transfer to UCLA. Students who successfully complete the program and satisfy transfer admission and major-preparation requirements are given priority consideration for admission to College of Letters and Science majors (except Communication Studies). TAP students also have access to the UCLA Library and select sporting events and can compete for a \$4,000 Wasserman Scholarship at UCLA, which may be renewable.

The Center for Community College Partnerships (CCCP)

CCCP is responsible for developing and strengthening academic partnerships between UCLA and California community colleges, particularly those with large underrepresented student populations. CCCP works closely with community college administrators, faculty and staff to strengthen and diversify curriculum, create strong academic support programs, improve students' academic competitiveness for admission to the University and increase the diversity of UCLA's transfer admit pool. In addition, CCCP staff also work closely with the Office of Undergraduate Admissions and the Community College Transfer Recruitment staff, the AAP Transfer Student Center and other campus offices to help coordinate UCLA's overall efforts with community colleges.

The center is also responsible for the UCLA Summer Intensive Transfer Experience (SITE), a six-day academic residential program, which seeks to inspire first-generation, low-income and underrepresented community college students to transfer by introducing them to the rigors of university life and by providing them with the necessary information to transfer. Students live on campus and meet UCLA faculty, staff and students. They attend writing workshops and a simulated lecture, discuss note-taking and time management and learn about other college skills. Students participate in a series of workshops dealing with careers, majors, graduate/research programs and using the Internet for research; they also meet admissions representatives from UCLA and other UC campuses.

Transfer Admission Guarantee (TAG)

The UCSC TAG Program offers guaranteed admission to qualified junior-level transfers from any of the 109 California community colleges that choose to participate. To apply for UCSC TAG, students must have completed a minimum of 30 UC-transferable semester units (45 quarter units), have a GPA of at least 3.0 and be registered at one of the participating community colleges. Students who have completed 20 semester (30 quarter) units at a four-year college or university are not eligible for the UCSC TAG Program. UCSC TAG offers are for the fall quarter only; the filing period is August 1 through October 15.

STARS: Services for Transfer and Re-Entry Students

Services for Transfer and Re-Entry Students (STARS) provides support services to students who are entering UCSC from community colleges or four-year institutions, undergraduates 25 or older or graduate students 29 or older, individuals who have had a substantial break in their college education and are returning to school, military veterans and all students who are also parents. The program offers a wide range of academic and personal services including advising, tutorial services, academic skills workshops, writing courses, orientation programs, topical seminars, support groups, social events, family services, and scholarship programs and resources.

STARS has two resource centers housed in different locations on campus. STARS at the Academic Resources Center and STARS at Kresge are comfortable places to study, relax and meet friends. An open-door policy allows students to obtain assistance with admissions, academic and personal issues. Computer workstations, couches, mini-kitchens with coffee and tea, and reading material make each of these centers a home away from home for many students during their stay on campus.

STARS also offers support services to Karl S. Pister Leadership Opportunity Award recipients and administers Renaissance Scholars, a program for former foster youth. Selectively chosen, Pister Scholars are UCSC transfer students from 13 regional community colleges who have shown exceptional academic achievement despite adversity and who have demonstrated commitment to improving the lives of others. Each Pister Scholar receives a \$20,000 scholarship over two years, mentorship, priority enrollment and guaranteed on-campus housing.

For Renaissance Scholars, STARS offers a network of educational support services that includes a designated community college counselor, a UC transfer adviser, transfer application assistance, financial aid and scholarship advising, leadership training and opportunities, mentorship and priority enrollment.

STARS also sponsors COMET (College Odyssey: Making Easier Transitions), a program for admitted transfer students in the spring quarter. Students are invited to campus to meet with an assigned transfer or re-entry student mentor. The mentors show the admitted students around campus, take them to a class or two in their area of academic interest, and answer any questions about transferring to UC Santa Cruz. Students are also treated to lunch on campus.

Transfer Student Housing Options

University housing accommodations for new transfer students include residence halls and apartments in the 10 colleges, the Village, University Inn and University Town Center. Many of the facilities offer transfer-specific areas or sections reserved for upperclassmen. UC Santa Cruz offers a two-year housing guarantee to all new undergraduate students entering in the fall quarter who choose to live in university housing for single undergraduates. This includes college residence halls and apartments, as well as other housing options both on and off campus.

Family Student Housing is a community for students and their families, offering two-bedroom, unfurnished apartments. Facilities include a counseling center, play areas and laundry rooms. UCSC Early Education Services offers several child care programs, serving children ranging in age from three months to 12 years.
