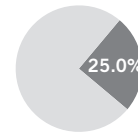

Chancellor Robert J. Birgeneau, an internationally known physicist, assumed leadership of the Berkeley campus in early October.

Berkeley offers more than 100 majors in five colleges and schools. New majors include Chemical Biology, B.S.; Environmental Economics and Policy, B.A. (now offered in the College of Letters and Science); Molecular Toxicology, B.S.; Operations Research and Management Science, B.A.; and Public Health, B.A.

Housing, both on and off campus, is now plentiful and easy to secure. In fall 2004, 228 spaces in the new Channing-Bowditch apartments became available. In spring 2005 and fall 2005, an additional 400 spaces will open each term in upgraded high-rise dorms two blocks from campus.

Berkeley graduates are successful. Among the class of 2003, 62.5% were employed full time or in graduate school within six months of receiving their degrees.

More than 750 undergraduates participated in research opportunities last year through the Undergraduate Research Apprentice Program. This innovative program gives undergraduates an opportunity to work one-on-one with faculty members on the cutting-edge research projects for which Berkeley is world-renowned.

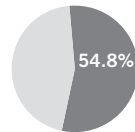

The Leadership Development Series provides hands-on, interactive experiences in a variety of workshops that promote community service and help students master effective communication and develop organizational leadership skills.

UC Davis graduates move into the world with success. Among 2002 graduates, 57% were employed full-time one year after graduation. Another 38% were in graduate school or had completed a post-graduate degree or credential; 86% of these students were accepted into their first- or second-choice graduate or professional schools.

The Robert Mondavi Institute for Wine and Food Science, the state-of-the-art research and teaching facility for the departments of viticulture and enology, food science and technology, is set to open in 2006.

Davis has one of the largest internship programs in the United States, with more than 6,000 students participating.

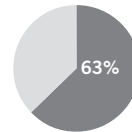

The School's partnerships with the Southern California "Tech Coast" open doors to unique internships and careers.

The Department of Earth System Science is ranked among the top programs nationally for its research impact worldwide. Its recently opened Center for International Study explores issues such as global warming and gives students an opportunity to study with preeminent researchers in an emerging field.

The School of Social Ecology delves into some of society's most complex social and environmental issues, with majors in Applied Ecology, Environmental Analysis and Design, Criminology, Law and Society, and Psychology and Social Behavior. The program emphasizes practical experience, with student field study placements ranging from city planning departments to local courts and social agencies.

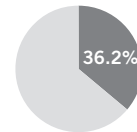

UCLA students are involved. In the Student Research Program, undergraduates work side by side with world-renowned UCLA scholars on cutting-edge research. In addition, approximately 7,000 students participate in community service projects each year.

UCLA undergraduates get hands-on experience by pursuing internships. Through the Field Studies Development Program, students augment classroom experience with public service in the community. The Extramural Programs and Opportunities (EXPO) Center gives students a chance to work with elected officials in the White House or U.S. Congress, the state government in Sacramento or in the Greater Los Angeles area.

International studies programs are among the most diverse of any American university. The UCLA International Institute coordinates international education and research through 14 multidisciplinary centers and programs focusing on major world regions and on global issues that cut across regional boundaries.

The Henry Samueli School of Engineering and Applied Science ranks among the top 10 engineering schools in the country. Undergraduate programs prepare students for professional careers as well as for advanced studies in engineering or other fields.

Honors Programs offers academic programs and services designed to promote an outstanding honors education to students in the College of Letters and Science. Participating students (including transfers) can complete enriched courses, explore opportunities within departments or design their own majors.

UC Merced has active research partnerships with Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory, Sequoia and Kings Canyon National Parks, and Yosemite National Park, where a research station is already established in Wawona.

Academic programs will offer an innovative blend of theoretical and practical education to better prepare UC Merced students for future careers. The Community Service Projects in Engineering, for example, allow students to work on projects that directly benefit non-profit organizations.

Founding students at UC Merced will have a once-in-a-lifetime chance to shape campus traditions and create clubs and organizations for future students.

Emphasizing the priority placed on environmental stewardship and sustainability, **UC Merced is the first university campus to be designed and constructed with “green building” practices.**

Incorporating UC Merced’s interdisciplinary thrust in research and academic programs, **the first two signature research institutes established at UC Merced** are the Sierra Nevada Research Institute and the World Cultures Institute.

With only 1,000 students, **UC Merced’s student/faculty ratio is 15 to 1.**
