

Additional Data on Students with High SAT Scores Who Are Denied at One or More Campuses

How many freshman applicants with SAT I scores of above 1400 were denied admission by more than 1 campus?

The tables below display data on Fall 2003 freshman applicants with SAT I scores of above 1400 who were not admitted to at *least one* UC campus. The data exclude non-California residents, UC-ineligibles, and cancelled applications.

The tables show the number of campuses applicants applied to and the number of campuses where they were not admitted. For example, in Table 1, of the 679 students who applied to 4 campuses and were denied by at least 1 campus, 330 (49%) were not admitted by 1 campus, 213 (31%) were not admitted by 2 campuses, and 136 (20%) were not admitted by 3 campuses. Any California resident who is UC eligible is admitted to a UC campus (usually Riverside) often through the referral pool.

Table 2 shows that 295 applicants applied to six of the *competitive* campuses and were not admitted by at least one campus. Of these 295 students 78 (26%) were denied by 1 campus, 77 (26)% were denied at 2 campuses, and 140 (47%) were denied at 3 or more campuses.

Table 3 shows that applications to the three most competitive campuses – Berkeley, UCLA, and San Diego. Of the 1,326 applicants denied by at least one of the 3 campuses, 562 (42%) were not admitted to 1 of the 3 campuses, 429 (32%) were not admitted to 2 campuses, and 335 (25%) were denied by all 3 campuses. Table 4 shows applications to Davis, Santa Barbara, and Irvine. In comparison to Table 3, far fewer students (117) applied to Davis, Santa Barbara and Irvine and were denied by at least one. Table 3 and 4 seem to confirm a finding from the January study group meeting that as campuses become more selective, they are more discriminating among even the most highly qualified applicants.
