



## UC PROJECTS

If passed by California voters, Proposition 1D will provide \$10.4 billion in bond financing for public school, college and university facilities throughout the state. It would earmark \$7.3 billion for kindergarten through 12th–grade schools, \$1.5 billion for community colleges and \$690 million each for California State University and the University of California over two years. An additional \$200 million would be used to expand UC medical education and telemedicine programs.

Each UC campus would receive Prop. 1D funding:

### **BERKELEY**

UC Berkeley would receive \$26.8 million, including \$10.4 million for infrastructure improvements to Birge Hall, \$10 million in renovations of Durant Hall, and \$6.4 million for seismic and program improvements for the campus' physical sciences facilities.

### **DAVIS**

UC Davis would receive \$30.1 million for campus improvements, including \$17.9 million for renovating and expanding the law school's King Hall to address serious deficiencies resulting from a near doubling of enrollment over the past four decades and \$7.9 million for planning and working drawings for the Veterinary Medicine 3B building, which would provide modern research labs in the campus's health sciences district for faculty members currently in obsolete and inadequate space in 56-year-old Haring Hall. Another \$4.3 million would go for new electrical substations and other upgrades to meet projected demand to ensure reliable electrical service.

### **IRVINE**

UC Irvine would receive a total of \$122.1 million, including \$39.9 million for the Arts Building, \$37.6 million for construction of its Social and Behavioral Sciences Building, \$25.7 million for the Humanities Building, \$9.8 million for seismic improvements and renovations of Steinhaus Hall, \$6.6 million for engineering and biological science equipment, and \$2.6 million for electrical infrastructure improvements.

### **LOS ANGELES**

UCLA would receive \$38.6 million for construction of its Life Sciences Replacement Building.

### **MERCED**

UC Merced would use a total of \$39.9 million for preliminary plans, working drawings and construction of its Social Sciences and Management Building.

### **RIVERSIDE**

UC Riverside would receive a total of \$92 million, including \$32.6 million for renovations of Boyce and Webber Halls; \$18 million for construction of the Student Academic Support Services Building; \$12 million for construction costs to expand the Environmental Health and Safety facilities; \$9 million for Geology Building renovations; \$8 million for working drawings and construction of the Culver Center for the Arts; equipment for the Psychology Building (\$2 million) and for the Humanities and Social Sciences Instruction and Research Facility (\$940,000); \$8.9 million for East Campus infrastructure improvements; and \$402,000 for Batchelor Hall renovations.

## **SAN DIEGO**

UC San Diego would receive \$94.5 million, including \$75.1 million for 110,000 square feet of class and research laboratories and office space for the Structural and Materials Engineering Building to accommodate engineering student enrollment growth; \$13.1 million for much needed renovations to the 43-year-old Mayer Hall; \$2.2 million of equipment for the Music Building, including audio systems and pianos; \$1.0 million for planning costs for the second phase of the Management School Facility, which will provide auditorium and classroom space for the new Rady School of Management; and \$3.2 million for improvements to the campus' chilled water and electrical distribution systems.

## **SAN FRANCISCO**

UCSF would receive \$17.8 million in Prop. 1D funding, including \$16.4 million to upgrade the heating, ventilation and air-conditioning (HVAC) system in the medical sciences research and teaching building – infrastructure which has been in use since 1950 without renovation, causing poor, inefficient operation. A steam heat system would be converted to an efficient hot water system, and the capacity of a chilled water plant would be increased. Prop. 1D funds (\$1.4 million) would also be used for planning and working drawings for the second phase of electrical distribution improvements on UCSF's Parnassus campus, enabling better control of emergency power and reducing electrical shortages.

## **SANTA BARBARA**

UC Santa Barbara would receive \$44.8 million, including \$24.6 million for construction of education and social science facilities; planning and working drawings for additional space and renovations for Davidson Library (\$3.4 million), seismic correction and renewal for the Arts Building (\$1.9 million) and Phelps Hall renovation (\$1.1 million); \$6.3 million for electrical infrastructure construction; \$5.6 million for the first phase of campus infrastructure renewal; and \$2 million for the realignment of El Colegio Road.

## **SANTA CRUZ**

UC Santa Cruz would receive a total of \$143 million for seismic, safety and renovation improvements to the McHenry library and the addition of 90,000 square feet, the first new library space since the early 1990s; 25,000 feet of office, research and teaching space for digital media programs, including state-of-the-art media and photography labs; infrastructure improvements for 40-year-old campus heating, gas, electricity, fire protection and storm drainage systems; and 60,000 square feet of facilities for biomedical science and engineering programs.

## **MEDICAL EDUCATION FUNDING ALLOCATION**

The UC Regents are expected to adopt a plan for allocating the medical education bond funds at their November 15-16 meeting.
