



Proposition 3 – Children’s Hospital Funding University of California Projects

The University of California operates five Children’s Hospitals that treat seriously ill and injured children in regions across the state. Approximately 20% of Proposition 3 funding – about \$39 million for each hospital over the next 10 years – would go to expand and renovate these UC medical facilities, make seismic upgrades and add life-saving medical equipment.

The funds would help provide for the much-needed expansion of critical care services, including a new pediatric intensive care unit, pediatric surgery center and pediatric cancer ward.

With an increasing number of premature infants in San Diego County, UC San Diego is committed to expanding and enhancing current facilities and technologies to meet the growing demand for specialized services, and provide the best care available in a safe, modern environment.

Future planning options include renovation of current facilities, or the possible construction of a dedicated women’s and infants’ pavilion with a sophisticated new neonatal intensive care center, which this funding would help support.
