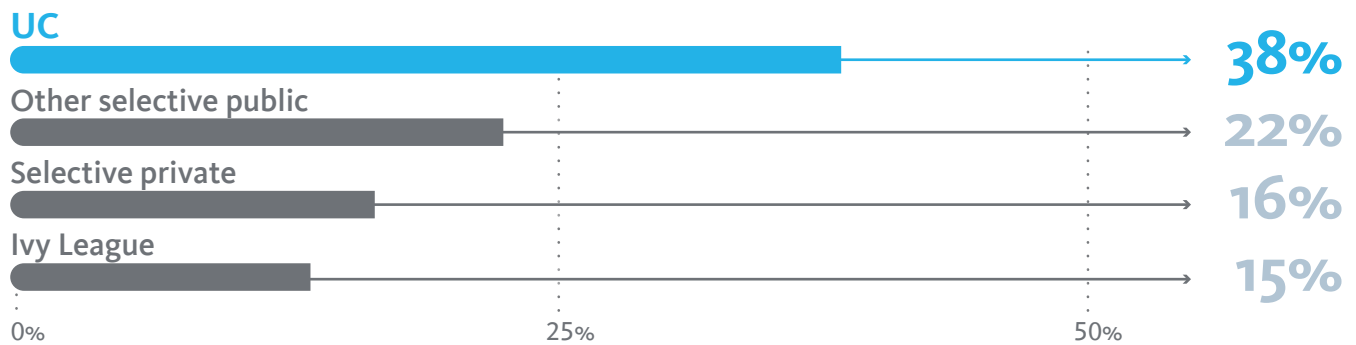
UC OPENS THE GATES TO A BRIGHTER FUTURE

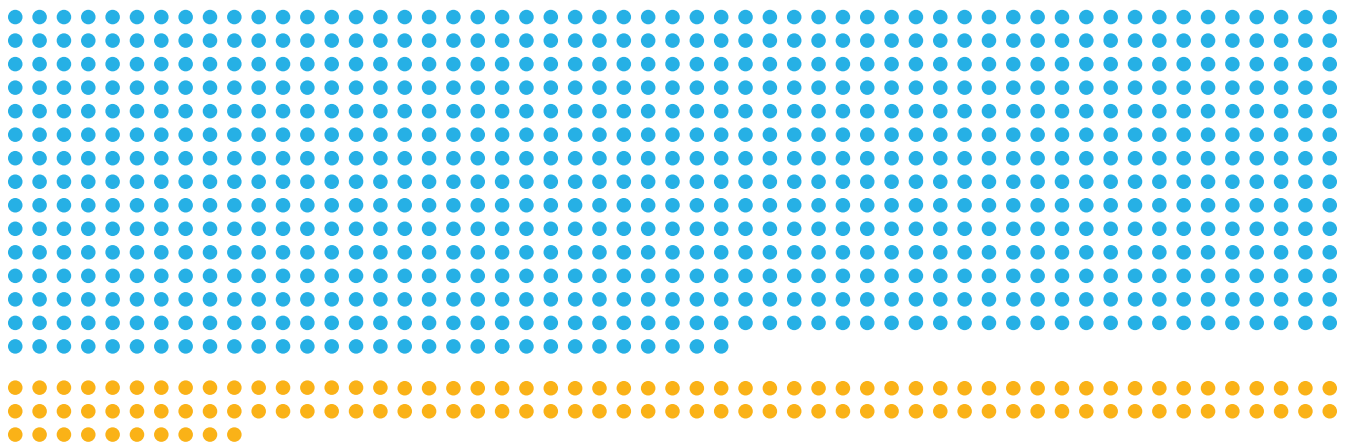
WELCOMING ALL WHO DREAM BIG

UC ENROLLS MORE LOW-INCOME STUDENTS THAN ANY OTHER INSTITUTION OF ITS CALIBER.

The University of California enrolls **80,104** low-income students, while the ivy league universities combined enroll fewer than **9,337** low-income students.



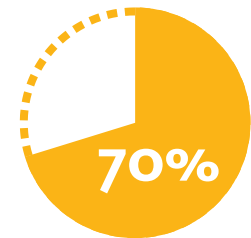
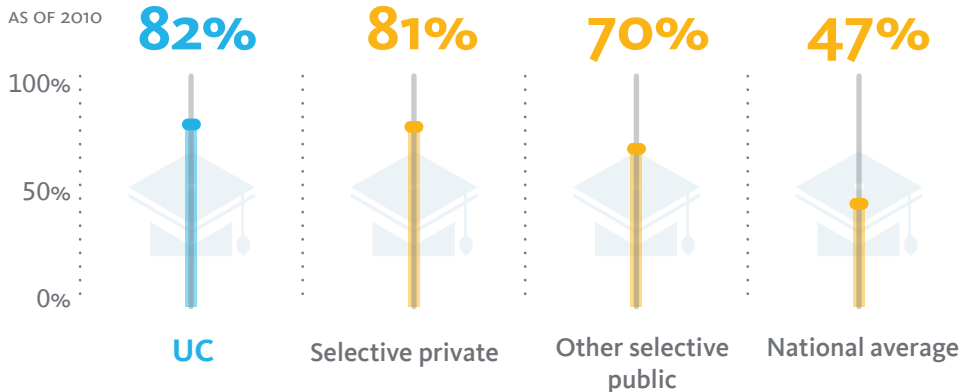
● = 100 students

SEEING STUDENTS THROUGH TO DIPLOMA, AND BEYOND

LOW-INCOME STUDENTS DON'T ONLY ENROLL AT UC — THEY SUCCEED.



70% of UC's low-income students go on to work in California.

82% of low-income students at UC schools earn degrees within six years, as compared with 70% of low-income students at other highly selective public institutions.

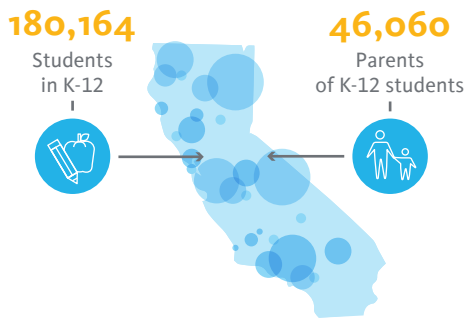
NATIONALLY, higher education is struggling to serve these students: Less than half of all low-income students who enter four-year colleges and universities go on to earn degrees.

Within five years, their median individual income exceeds that of their families when they entered UC.

PREPARING YOUNGSTERS FOR GREATNESS

REACH OF UC PROGRAMS FOR ACADEMIC AND COLLEGE-READINESS

UC is at work in schools around the state to help students prepare for and apply to college, whether at UC or elsewhere.



UC also served 38,964 community college students (2014-15) through programs to help them transfer to UC.

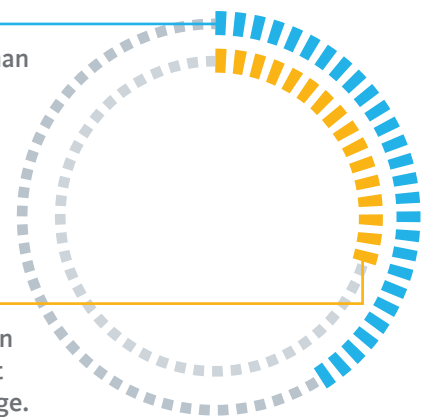


66% of students in UC-led college preparation programs take college entrance exams, compared to 42% of non-participants.

40% Of the 2016 freshman class were first-generation college students.

30% Came from homes in which English is not the primary language.



PROVIDING ONGOING SUPPORT



57% of California resident students pay \$0 tuition because of programs such as the Blue and Gold Opportunity Plan, covering families with incomes of \$80,000 or less.
